Voters may choose to vote at any of the following polling places on October 18<sup>th</sup>. Except as noted here, polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

## **We're bringing the election to you!**

We're making it more convenient for you to vote.

An electronic list of electors will be used. This means you can walk into any polling station on Election Day, show your ID, and cast your ballot. It's as simple as that.

Once you've voted, your name will be marked as "already voted" on the list of electors, and the list will be automatically updated at all polling stations.

We're also bringing voting to where people are. Besides locations in various neighbourhoods around the City, we're also setting up polling stations in high-traffic places where people usually gather on workdays.

### **To be eligible to vote you must be:**

- a Canadian Citizen;
- 18 years of age or older; and
- a resident of Whitehorse for at least one year as of October 18, 2018

## **Options for Voting**

Not in town on Election Day? You can still vote:

**Special Ballots** will be available at City Hall starting at noon on Wednesday, October 3<sup>rd</sup>. The Elections Office is open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. every business day from October 3<sup>rd</sup> until polling day.

If you are going to be outside the City during the election period and can't make it in to City Hall before you leave, you may appoint a proxy to vote on your behalf.

Contact the Elections Office at 668-8611 or go to the Elections section on the City's website at [www.whitehorse.ca](http://www.whitehorse.ca) and download a form to appoint a proxy. The person you appoint as your proxy can bring the signed form in to City Hall and vote on your behalf.

If you can't attend a poll because of a disability, we can even bring the poll to you. Contact the Elections Office at City Hall for more information.

## **Identification Required**

### **You need ID to vote.**

The best is picture ID that includes your birthday and your current residential address.

Your Driver's Licence or Yukon General Identification Card are two good examples.

If your ID only shows a post office box for an address, please bring a phone, electric, cable or other service bill to prove you are living at your current address.

If you don't have photo ID, there's a solution: bring two documents that show your name and address (with at least one showing your age) to the polling station. For example, a Health Care Card with a cable or electric bill would work.
