Through a partnership with Yukon government, Kwanlin Dün recruited three Citizens for crew positions on Yukon government's Wildland Fire Management crew for the 2013 forest fire season.

Kwanlin Dün members Kory Sawrenko, Daniel Cletheroe and Darcey Carlick worked on the crew and were commended for their dedication in working through the duration of the 2013 fire season and remaining together as a crew for the

duration. The 2013 fire season was a busy one and ranked as the fifth most severe in the territory in the last 55 years. A total 176 fires burned in Yukon this season and burned approximately 270,000 hectares which is 150 per cent more than normal.

Kudos to Kory, Daniel and Darcey on a job well done! Wildland Fire Management has expressed an interest in bringing on more Kwanlin Dün crew members next season.

Kwanlin Dün Elder Judy Gingell Invested into the Order of Canada

On May 3, 2013, His Excellency the Right Honourable David Johnston, Governor General of Canada, presided over an Order of Canada investiture ceremony at Rideau Hall. Kwanlin Dün Elder Judy Gingell was among the 44 recipients being honoured that day. She was invested as Member of the Order of Canada.

For more than 40 years, Judy Gingell has promoted and advanced Aboriginal rights and governance in Yukon. As chair of the Council of Yukon First Nations, she was instrumental in self-governance and land claims negotiations with the Government of Canada. She served as Yukon's first Aboriginal commissioner and was renowned for her ability to build bridges between peoples, notably by raising awareness of First Nations culture through the annual Commissioner's Potlatch. As a leader and Elder of Kwanlin Dün First Nation, she has ensured that First Nations communities are key players in the territorial economy.

The Order of Canada was created in 1967, during Canada's centennial year, to recognize a lifetime of outstanding achievement, dedication to the community and service to the nation. Since its creation, more than 6 000 people from all sectors of society have been invested into the Order.



Kwanlin Dün recognizes Yukoners for Prehistoric Bison Fossil Discoveries

Two unexpected and rare discoveries were made by Yukoners in April 2012 when prehistoric bison fossils were unearthed in the Whitehorse area. Kwanlin Dün First Nation and Yukon government hosted an event to publicly thank the individuals for their actions that led to the recovery of two sets of fossils.

“It’s not every day that such exciting discoveries are made. It’s important that we take the time to appreciate the contribution that these discoveries make to our understanding of the past and to recognize the people who discovered them,” said Chief Rick O’Brien at the event.

Marcus Deuling, son of Jud and Amanda Deuling made the first discovery April 22, 2012 while skiing at Fish Lake. Deuling noticed part of a bison skull eroding out of the frozen bank. The Deuling family took photos of the skull and contacted the Yukon Paleontology Program. Due to the frozen conditions, recovery work took place later that summer. Radio carbon dating puts the Fish Lake bison fossil skull at approximately 3,800 years old.

Marcus Deuling’s find was in the Fish Lake area within Kwanlin Dün Settlement Land. Kwanlin Dün’s Lands department worked with Yukon government officials to unearth the skull. An agreement between our governments allows for Yukon government to house the

artifact until such time as we are able to store artifacts ourselves. The cooperation between our governments on this find is just one of the many ways that we are working together in areas of common concern.

“The Fish Lake area of Kwanlin Dün’s Settlement Land is of great significance to Kwanlin Dün and finds of this nature help shed light on ancestral times,” Chief Rick O’Brien said. “I’m pleased to extend Kwanlin Dün’s appreciation to the Deuling family for their diligence in reporting this exciting find.”

Kwanlin Dün First Nation Lands officers and Department of Tourism and Culture archaeologists and palaeontologists unearthed a complete bison skull. By agreement between Government of Yukon and Kwanlin Dün First Nation, the Fish Lake bison fossil is currently stored in Yukon’s palaeontology fossil collection.

Fish Lake is a significant area for Kwanlin Dün people and these historical finds are valuable resources for us all to share and learn from. Oral history gathered from our Elders and digs of the area have revealed patterns of land use and settlement by our people spanning thousands of years in the Fish Lake area. Discoveries like the ones discussed here allow for greater understanding of the history of the land and our people.

Creating Employment Pathways through Training and Mentorship Positions



An important part of Kwanlin Dün's approach to Human Resources involves continually seeking out and leveraging opportunities to create employment for KDFN members.

One of the ways that we are doing this is through trainee and mentor positions that provide work experience and on the job training by working under an experienced mentor. These positions provide members with the opportunity to gain work experience and training that they can use to pursue employment with KDFN or that they can bring to other organizations.

In the 2012-13 fiscal year, Kwanlin Dün created and hired members in to temporary trainee and mentorship positions with funding support through an Indian and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) program. Kwanlin Dün has been successful in accessing funding dollars for mentoring positions again this year. These positions provide for a minimum of 15 weeks' employment and provide on the job training for members.

Under the program, Jeanine George was hired as KDFN's Records Management Clerk Trainee. Jeanine is working as part of Kwanlin Dün's records management team. The team is working towards documenting, classifying and storing Kwanlin Dün's paper and electronic records.

Kwanlin Dün's trainee positions are supported by a learning program with modules that the incumbents complete during the course of their employment in the trainee program. *Welcome Jeanine!*

- Report any unusual activity that you see in your neighborhood. Residents have a shared responsibility when it comes to protecting the safety and security of the community.


Healthy Babies, Healthy Generations Program Summer Recap

Notice: Tank Farm Trail Users

If you use the trail toward downtown that runs through the 'tank farm' property (located across Hamilton Boulevard), please note that access to the property is prohibited, and may be unsafe.

The expansive property, commonly referred to as the 'tank farm' contains numerous buried fuel tanks that were originally placed there by the military and White Pass. The current owners of the property have begun a remediation project to unearth and dispose of the tanks and to restore the soils.

The project will involve unearthing hazardous waste and will utilize heavy equipment in the area. KDFN Lands department in cooperation with the City of Whitehorse are advising residents of the dangers and have devised an alternate trail for those who wish to utilize a trail system to reach downtown.

The map printed here shows the suggested alternate route in blue, and shows the original tank farm trail in red. Due to the health hazards and remediation work involving heavy equipment, residents are strongly advised to respect the signs and fencing intended to keep the public safe by forbidding access to the site.

KDFN Records Management Initiative Takes Flight



Kwanlin Dün is forging ahead in an initiative to implement a KDFN-wide electronic records management system. To date, departments providing front-line services for Citizens have integrated systems to manage their records and meet reporting requirements, but Kwanlin Dün lacked a centralized solution for classifying and storing its records.

Part of the work to identify, document and sort existing records began last fiscal year with the hiring of Records Management Clerks Irma Scharff and Melissa O'Brien, who began the tedious process of reviewing and sorting documents housed in various storage areas within KDFN's buildings.

It quickly became evident that a system of classification and storage was needed in order to properly account for the existing documents and for all the records created on a daily basis across the organization.

In early 2013, Kwanlin Dün began the work of researching and analyzing options for electronic records management systems through research, interviews and best practices gathered by Jacquie Shorty.

Jacquie's research led her to study the best practices, requirements and systems used by First Nation governments in other parts of the country as no known electronic records management systems are in use among Yukon's First Nations.

With thanks to Jacquie's commitment and hard work, Kwanlin Dün was successful in attracting Teslin Tlingit Council to partner in a three-year project to implement electronic records management systems. Funds supporting the project proposal were awarded from the Indian People Training Trust fund administered by the Training Policy Committee of CYFN.

The three-year training plan will guide Kwanlin Dün and Teslin Tlingit Council through the processes, training and administrative requirements that must be in place prior to adoption of an electronic records management system.

Prior to establishing its electronic records management system, Kwanlin Dün's records management team will be guiding the organization in the following tasks:

- Defining a system for organizing and classifying records;
- Drafting a schedule that dictates how long certain record types are kept active before being archived;
- Developing a Records Management policy;
- Creating a Procedures Manual and communication plan for the ongoing training and educating of staff members;
- Establishing a "Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy" Act to define how KDFN shares its documents in a way that respects all its Citizens.

Council recognizes the importance of keeping comprehensive and accessible records and has supported the creation of a permanent Records Management Unit within Kwanlin Dün. Jacquie Shorty leads the Unit as Information and Records Management Administrator, Melissa O'Brien and Irma Scharff are Records Management Clerks and Jeanine George was hired as our Records Management Clerk Trainee. All KDFN's records management staff members are involved in the funded training plan, which help Kwanlin Dün to develop the knowledge and internal capacity to support its commitment to records management.

The theme for the special General Assembly was “Moving Forward Together” and was chosen as a way to acknowledge the vital role that Kwanlin Dün Citizens play in shaping the priorities of the First Nation. Kwanlin Dün’s programs, services and initiatives benefit greatly due to the active participation of our Citizens during consultation sessions and through Citizen involvement on our many boards and committees.

All the fun began on Friday evening at Jackson Lake with a dance performance by our Kwanlin Dün dancers before dinner. The evening entertainment included a hilarious, yet good-natured hypnotist show by renowned entertainer, Scott Ward, followed by a campfire jam session to complete the evening.

The agenda for the special General Assembly meeting on Saturday focussed on providing updates from a number of our working groups including the

Investment Trust, Housing Policy, Administration of Justice, Donations and Artwork, Constitutional Review, Citizenship and Elections Act working groups. We thank all KDFN Citizens who contribute to these committees and special thanks to those members who helped deliver working group updates to the General Assembly.

Executive Director Roxanne Vallevand and Assistant Executive Director Dorothy Sam provided a year in review summary of accomplishments and highlights from the recent fiscal year that included updates and information from all KDFN departments.

Grama Suzie and fiddler Boyd Benjamin treated the General Assembly with a funny and lively performance that left the crowd in stitches many times over! The gracious audience participation really helped make the show entertaining for everyone. Special thanks to our special guest Liard First Nation Chief Liard McMillan for gracing the crowd and Grama Suzie with his grouse dance and to Councillor Jessie Dawson and Constable Philip Whiles for dancing the two-step with Grama Suzie!

Chief Liard McMillan Addresses Special General Assembly on the Many Impacts of Defamation

Chief Liard McMillan of Liard First Nation was a guest of the special General Assembly and offered a presentation regarding the legal consequences and damaging effects that knowingly spreading mistruths about others can have within a First Nation.

Liard spoke to the General Assembly regarding his recent experience in a Yukon Supreme Court ruling in his favour on a defamation lawsuit against a First Nation member who knowingly spread and published mistruths about the Chief and members of his administration.

The Chief explained some of the unexpected ill-effects that the gossip had on moving the business of the First Nation forward. His Nation was subject to stricter requirements around program accountabilities to its funders and experienced challenges in accessing funding to provide services for their Citizens. Chief Liard also described a negative impact on the confidence level among industry in partnering with the First Nation. Internally, the First Nation noted an increase in stress-related ailments and loss of productivity among those targeted by the defamatory statements.

Inform Yourself:

What is defamation?

The Canadian Bar Association website defines defamation as communication about a person that tends to hurt the person's reputation. The communication must be made to other people, not just to the person it's about. The statement must be false to be classified as defamation. If it is spoken, then defamation is termed "slander". If it is written with a permanent record, like a newspaper, a letter, a website posting, an email, a picture, or a radio or TV broadcast, it is termed "libel".

The law protects an individual's reputation against defamation, libel and slander. Making defamatory statements about another person can be grounds for a lawsuit. The person who has made the statements can be ordered by the court to pay money for damage to another person's reputation caused by their actions.

What about the right to free speech?

The law protects a person's reputation but this protection can restrict other rights, such as the right to free speech. The law tries to balance these competing rights.

In July, Kwanlin Dün opened its Employment Services Office, located at the House of Learning in McIntyre. The purpose of the Office is to assist Kwanlin Dün Citizens in meeting their employment goals no matter where they are in their employment journey.

Tannis Preete is Kwanlin Dün’s full-time Employment Services Officer. Tannis explains that each person’s path to satisfying employment looks different, as each person’s employment goals are unique to them. As the Employment Services Officer, Tannis works one-on-one with each of her clients. Tannis guides her clients in creating their own path toward employment and supports them as they move through the steps of the plan toward finding and keeping rewarding employment.

The Employment Services Office works within KDFN’s team approach to assist Citizens in reaching their goals. This case management approach recognizes that one aspect of a person’s life can have an impact on other areas of their life. A person wanting to move forward in one area of their life may also need support and assistance in other areas. When clients ask for help in different areas, KDFN departments are ready to work together to meet that person’s individual needs.

The Employment Services Office can connect clients to other services within Kwanlin Dün or in Whitehorse to help them move through challenges that they face in securing rewarding employment. The Officer also has ties to employers, counselling services, education, labour market programs and information, job opportunities of all kinds and training opportunities. The Employment Services Officer can connect clients to the information and services they need to move ahead, but most importantly, stays connected to the client every step of


